McCluskey, Glen: Member of former Lewisville Village Council and instrumental in the creation of Lewisville Park in 1967.

Robichaud, Louis J.: Premier of New Brunswick from 1960-1970 and a member of the Senate of Canada from 1973-2000. He passed away on January 6th, 2005.

People	
Agnew, Earl:	Enlisted in the army during World War II. "His family served the fire department through several generations." He participated in the assault of the Netherlands. He was buried in the Bergen op Zoom cemetery in Belgium in November 1944. <i>Not for the Glory. P. 131.</i>
Babang, A. J	Owned a flour and grocery store in the 1800's on Main street.
Babineau, Jean	One of the founding Acadian families of the Bend c.1733.
Barnum, Phineas T.	Owned the circus known as "The Greatest Show on Earth" that came to Moncton in June 14, 1879. <i>P.278 Resurgo vol 1.</i>
Bauer, Clarence	"On May 5, 1937 an accident occurred between the CNR Ocean Ltd. and a set of 8 runaway coal cars. Clarence Bauer stayed with the train to attempt to slow it down and lessen the impact. According to witnesses and reports of the day, the accident would have been far worse if it was not for the efforts of Clarence Bauer, who was killed in the collision."
Berlinquette, Louis	Member of the Moncton Victoria's who competed for the Stanley Cup in 1911-12 and later had a successful pro career.
Binney, Stephen	Resident of Moncton for 28 years, he was one of the town's most successful shipbuilders and businessmen. Binney died in 1872. <i>City of Moncton's bank of names.</i>
Biron, Eugène-Raymond	Born in France, he became the first director of the Saint-Louis college in Saint-Louis, New Brunswick.
Blanchard, Guillaume	Explored up the Petitcodiac river with Pierre Thibodeau during his second voyage to the region. Blanchard settled in the Memramcook Valley.
Bourgeois, Aurèle	Police officer murdered in the line of duty in 1974 at the age of 47.
Bovard, Thomas John	Born in Moncton in 1894, and died in WWI on November 19, 1917. He is buried at the Brandhoek military cemetery number three in Belgium.
Bowness, Walter S.:	Responsible for the only Moncton built/assembled automobile with his partner Alex Carter. The car was 'placed on display May 7, 1901. <i>Resurgo vol 2. p. 85.</i>
Bulmer, Howard E. Oscar H. Bulmer	Monctonians who died in WWI.
Cadieux, Jean	Third president of l'Université de Moncton from 1974 to 1979. He died at the age of 81 in February 2006.
Christie, William	William Christie owned and operated a bakery on Main Street in Moncton from 1877 to 1920.
Copple, William	One of the first Irish families to settle in Moncton. Owned a soap and candle shop on Bonnaccord street in 1860.
Corcoran, Thomas	Perhaps the first of the Irish Catholics to arrive around 1810. He is considered to have been Moncton's first schoolteacher.
Cormier, Henri (père)	Became a priest in the Assomption parish in 1914 and was a strong promoter of French education in the region. He was also the founder of l'Académie Sacré-Coeur. He died in 1938.

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Cowan, Charles K	Moncton artist who worked in the drapery department for the T. Eaton Co. and was a founding member of the Moncton Art Society. He died in 1974.
Croasdale, William J	Chief Engineer for the Intercolonial Railway.
Cuthbertson, Allen A.	Monctonian who was a Lance Corporal in WWI and who died during the war on November 16 th , 1914.
Cutler, Jonas	Born in 1792 at the Bend. His father, Ebenezer Cutler jr. owned a business in the region.
Cutler, Robert	Born in 1810 and the third son of Ebenezer Cutler jr. He later represented Kent County in the Provincial Legislature from 1850 to 1856 and the House of Commons from 1872-1878.
Debow, W.C	Manager of the Brunswick Hotel in the 1940's.
De Fiedmont	Chief Engineer of Fort Beausejour in the 1700s.
Dollar, William	"Appointed by Pope Gregory XVI as the first bishop of the new diocese of New Brunswick." <i>P.19 Moncton's catholic roots.</i>
Drillon, Gordon Arthur (Gordie)	He was born in 1914 in Moncton and became a prominent hockey player. He played in the N.H.L. for Toronto, Montreal, Pittsburgh, Syracuse etc. He won one Stanley cup with the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1943. He later joined the army during World War II. He died in Saint John in 1983.
Eddie	Joseph Edward Leger was a well-known street character and citizen in the city of Moncton. He past away October 16, 2004 at the age of 74.
Edington, John	Civil engineer that developed the Edington Port Plan. He was the director of the railway in the late 1800s.
Estano	An early Moncton Italian family who were prominent members of the business community. Louis Estano owned and operated a tinsmith and plumbing shop in the Victoria Block and his wife Mary operated the Ladies Art Store on Main Street.
Flett, William	Prominent Moncton photographer. William Flett was the Provincial Vice-president for the Maritime Professional Photographers Association.
Fowler, C.A	Architect for Moncton High School.
Fairweather	Prominent Moncton family who owned and operated a drug store in Moncton for over 52 years.
Frechet, R. A	Prominent Moncton architect. He designed the Provincial Bank of Canada building among many others.
Frost, Shepherd Johnson	Architect who is purported to have designed the Free Meeting House and was instrumental in designing many of the buildings in Chatham, NB after the big fire.
Frye, Northrop	One of Canada's most renowned authors, literary critics and educators. Born at Sherbrooke, Quebec on July 14 1912 and raised in Moncton.
Gamble, Dick	Monctonian who played professional hockey for 15 years for the Montreal Canadiens and the Chicago Black Hawks. <i>P. 303 A History of Moncton.</i>
Gauvreau, Ferdinand	First resident missionary of the Fox Creek, St. Anselme religious parish. <i>The Monctonians, vol 1 p. 284.</i>
Gillis, John	Died in 1902 in the line of duty at the Capitol Theatre fire.
Godin, Edouard	Acadian fisherman and farmer.
GrandFontaine, Hector d'Andigne de	became governor of Acadia in 1670 after Acadia was handed to France in 1667. <i>P. 15 Resurgo. Vol 1.</i>
Hallet, Robert	Born in 1828 in Sussex, New Brunswick. He was a photographer in Sackville, but later moved to Moncton and continued his photography and auction business. He died in 1897.
Hans, Jacob	Moncton's first rabbi.
Higman, Richard	Local chemist, analyst with the Moncton Sugar Refining Company. He was also ran a drug store in Moncton.
Houdini, Harry	known as "The Wonderful Magician", Houdini made an appearance along with his wife, "Mademoiselle Beatrice Houdini" at the Moncton Opera House in 1896. <i>Resurgo vol 2, p. 61.</i>
Humes, Roy Murray	He was a member of the Moncton Fire Department for 31 years. His

	son John and grandson Gary also became firefighters.
Hutchinson, Leonard	Chief of Moncton's police department from 1920 to 1946. As a Police Chief in the City of Moncton, Hutchinson introduced the city's first traffic control measures.
Kinraide, Thomas	Moncton native and scientist who in 1900 made remarkable discoveries concerning x-rays and wireless telegraphy. His discoveries put him in a class with Edison and Marconi.
Lapiere, Francoise, Joseph & Marguerite	One of the founding Acadian families of the Bend around 1733.
Larracey, Edward W	Born in Moncton, he became president of the Moncton Publishing Company and publisher of the Moncton Times and the Moncton Transcript. He retired in 1984. Larracey wrote many historical books on the City of Moncton. He died in 1992.
Lauvriere, Emile	Important historic author on Acadia. He was born in France in 1866. After finishing his studies in the city of Paris and London he became a teacher and devoted himself to study Acadia and the Acadian history. He died in 1954.
Law, Andrew Bonar	He was born in Rexton, New Brunswick. He was an important businessman and politician serving as leader of the British Conservative party and Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1922 to 1923.
La Valliere	Governor of Acadia in 1678. <i>Resurgo. P.18</i>
Lea, Paul	He established a woodworking plant on Westmorland Street in 1883 and built many fine Moncton homes including the Thomas Williams House.
Le Guerne, Francois	In 1755, after the attack on Fort Beauséjour, he was the only missionary and French remaining in the village
Le Loutre, Louis	Acadian religious leader in early 1700.
Lemieux, "Biff"	New Brunswick boxer in the 1920's.
Lescarbot, Marc	First French teacher in Acadia in 1606.
Lesser, Nathan and Joseph	First Jewish families to settle in Moncton c.1890.
Levesque, J.L	New Brunswick entrepreneur. Born in Gaspé, Quebec he became a racehorse owner and an important businessman. He worked for the Provincial bank of Canada in Moncton.
Lister, John Walter Jr	Well known photographer, originally from Fredericton. He owned Lister's Studio on Main Street.
Longfellow, Henry W	American writer that wrote the epic poem <i>Evangeline</i> .
Marshman, Henry	He was born in Germany in approximately 1850 and came to North America in the 1870's. He was a sugar refiner in Halifax and then moved to Moncton. When the sugar refinery burned he opened a photography business.
Marven, Joseph A	Owned and operated a biscuit and cookie factory in Moncton for over 50 years.
McCoy, Lonzo Fisher	He was a local artist and salesman and started his own postcard business known as the McCoy Printing Co. Many of his postcards are very collectible today.
McCully, Richard (Dick)	Pilot from Moncton who is well known for his aerial photographs of the Maritimes taken in the 1930's.
McGee	Jennie McGee owned and operated a local restaurant known as the <i>Kandy Kitchen</i> on Main Street for over 35 years. She is purported to be the first person to sell homemade ice cream in Moncton.
McGrath, Stan	Longtime City of Moncton Councilor, who passed away on August 2 nd , 2006.
Mehan, H.A Rev	First pastor of the Saint Bernard Roman Catholic Church in Moncton. <i>Moncton's catholic roots</i> .
Mellish, Roland	He lived in Lewisville and was a pilot in W.W.II. His plane was hit by enemy fire and tragically crashed.
Newcomb, Simon	"Called greatest astronomer of 19 th century, he was the grandson of Thomas Prince, and the son of Emily Prince who married John Burton Newcomb of Taylor Village, Westmorland Co. <i>The Monctonians p. 80</i> .

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Northrup, Fred	Founder of Toys for Big Boys and well know business man who passed away in 2006
O'Blenes, Harold	Chief of Moncton fire department who died overseas during WWII on March 10 th , 1942.
O'Leary, Michael	Police officer murdered in the line of duty December 13, 1974 along with Corporal Aurele Bourgeois.
Parsons, Jesse F.	Born in Medford, Nova Scotia in 1887. In the early 1900's he headed for the west of Canada where he got married and had children in Saskatchewan. He worked for the George Fuller Company and worked on the Legislature Building in Regina. He was sent to Moncton to oversee the construction of the T. Eaton Company's mail-order business in 1919. He opened his own business named the Parsons Construction Company Limited in 1922.
Paton, William	Opened Moncton's first schoolhouse in 1817. "It was situated on land just south of where the Free Meeting House was erected in 1821." <i>p. 136 Resurgo I.</i>
Perrigo, Ann	Prominent Moncton landowner and innkeeper during the 19 th century
Piers, Jim	Former Chief of Moncton Fire Department in 1971. He was a WWII navy veteran and also had a passion for curling, where he won three provincial mixed titles.
Pincombe, C. Alex	First archivist for the City of Moncton and noted historian, writer and teacher. Died September 8 th , 1989.
Poutraincourt	He accompanied Champlain and Sieur de Monts on their first visit to this region in an attempt to colonize New France.
Ricker, Jacob	One of the first families to settle in Moncton from Pennsylvania.
Rippey, William	Captain of the Moncton Fire Company. He retired from this post in October of 1879.
Sousa, John Philip	Great American bandmaster who performed in Moncton in 1895 and in 1926. He was born in 1854 and died in 1932. He was the most famous American bandleader of his time.
Spencer, Harold Arthur Clarence LeRoy Spencer	Harold and Clarence were two brothers that participated in World War I. Clarence was born in 1896 in Moncton and signed his attestation paper at Montreal at the age of 19. He survived the war and died in 1962 in Redondo Beach, California. Harold was born in 1897 in Moncton and signed his attestation paper in Kingston, Ontario at the age of 20 to join the "c" Battery of the royal Canadian Horse artillery. He survived the war and died in 1962 in California, the same year as his brother.
Stanton, Benjamin (Capt)	He settled at the Bend in 1827, and was one of the first shipbuilders in the region. <i>P. 52 Chocolate River.</i>
Starratt, William Thomas	Monctonian who was a Lance corporal in the Canadian Infantry during World War I. He died during the war on September 15 th , 1916.
Stevens, Thaddeus	Publisher of the Daily Times and served as mayor of the Town of Moncton in the 1880.
Skiffington, Ed	Moncton educator and the father of high school football in Moncton. Member of the NB and Moncton Sports Hall of Fame.
Tabbelli, Jasimiro	Italian worker who was killed in an accident on Feb.17th, 1909 while building the NTR line near Moncton.
Toner, Vance	Order of Canada recipient, member of the NB Sports Hall of Fame and former Head of the U de M Physical Education Faculty. He founded the school of physical education and recreation at the U de M as well as the Institute of leadership. Died in 2002.
Torrie, William	Owned a soap and candle business on Bonaccord street in Moncton in 1860. William Torrie was an active member of the St. Paul's Church Rectory building committee in 1886. He died in 1886 at the age of 57.
Tuttle	The Tuttle family have owned and operated a funeral home business on Lutz Street in Moncton since 1882.
Wilcox, Earl R	Well-known Moncton photographer. He became the manager of the

	McElwain Studio in 1929, and later changed the name to Wilcox Studio. He was president of the Maritime Professional Photographers Association in 1941 and a big promoter of local amateur sports teams like the YMCA Pawnees.
Wilde, Oscar	Controversial British writer, who visited Moncton in 1882 to give an evening lecture.
White, Fred J. Dr.	Born in Newfoundland, he studied at Mount Allison and at McGill University. He received his medical degree in 1886. He worked at the Moncton Hospital and “He gave generously of his time and his talents to promoting the interests of the hospital and the institution owes much of its success to his efforts and unselfish service.” <i>The struggle to serve, a history of the Moncton Hospital, 1895 to 1953 p. 18.</i>
Wong, Duncan	Owner and operator of the Palace Grill Restaurant on Main Street for many years.
Woods, Alexandrina	Woman that participated in World War II in the Canadian Women’s Army Corps in Moncton. She died in 1990.
Wyse	R.N. Wyse owned and operated a general dry goods store on Main Street for a number of years.

Albertite	“An asphaltic mineral discovered by the famous scientist, Abraham Gesner in 1849.” It was found in Albert County in New Brunswick. Tons of this hydrocarbon were shipped to Boston and New York. <i>P. 5 Resurgo, vol. I.</i>
Babineau	The mouth of the Coverdale River was called Babineau in the 1700s.
Baie Verte	New Brunswick body of water.
Big Salmon	River in the south east of the province of New Brunswick.
Black Bear	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick
Bobcat	Terrestrial mammal found in New Brunswick and in the south of Canada.
Bobolink	Bird found in New Brunswick.
Bore, the	Name of the natural phenomenon that occurs on the Petitcodiac River.
Bufflehead	Species of bird found in New Brunswick. It is Canada’s smallest diving duck.
Canvasback	Bird that can be occasionally observed in New Brunswick. It is one of the fastest flying ducks with speeds of 120 km an hour.
Caribou	Terrestrial mammal that once lived in New Brunswick.
Chocolate River	Name often used for the Petitcodiac River due to its brown color.
Coltsfoot	Species of plant found in New Brunswick.
Fisher	Medium size carnivore native to New Brunswick.
Folly	Body of water in the province of New Brunswick.
Forest Hawk	Species of bird native to New Brunswick.
Gray Wolf	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick.
Great Auk	Bird found in New Brunswick.
House Finch	Species of bird native to New Brunswick
Kennebecasis	A New Brunswick river.
Least Weasel	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick.
Linx	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick.
Marten	Medium size carnivores, using old spruce-fir or black spruce
Mascaret	Tidal river. The Petitcodiac is famous for this natural phenomenon.
Mink frog	New Brunswick amphibian.
Muskrat	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick.
Pearl Dace	Fresh water fish living in New Brunswick.
Porcupine	Mammal living in New Brunswick.
Puffin	New Brunswick bird. One of the most popular and well-known seabirds in Canada.
Pumpkinseed	Fresh water fish living in New Brunswick.
Pygmy Shrew	Terrestrial mammal living in New Brunswick.
Red Bat	Terrestrial mammal living in the province of New Brunswick.

Red Fox	Terrestrial mammal living in the province of New Brunswick.
Red Squirrel	Terrestrial mammal living in the province of New Brunswick.
Rhodora	Plant found in New Brunswick.
Smokey Shrew	Terrestrial mammal living in the province of New Brunswick.
Stonechat	New Brunswick bird.
Viceroy	Butterfly native to the province of New Brunswick.
Whale	The nearby Bay of Fundy is well known as the home to a variety of whale species. Pilot whales have frequented the Petitcodiac River in the past.
Willet	Species of bird native to New Brunswick.
Wolverine	Terrestrial mammal that once lived in New Brunswick.
Water Shrew	Mammal native to New Brunswick.
Woodchuck	Terrestrial mammal in New Brunswick. There are also known as groundhogs.

Ships / Boats / Planes / Trains	
Aginora	Ship built at Hopewell on the Petitcodiac River in 1866. Lost in the Magdalen Islands 1872.
Alarm	An 895-ton ship built in the Salter Shipyard in 1852. It was wrecked in Ireland in 1866, then repaired and re-registered in 1872. <i>The Chocolate River p. 208</i>
Albion	Vessel that the Geldart Family arrived on. Joshua Geldart and his nephew John Geldart arrived in 1774 from Yorkshire. "When Joshua Geldart decided to settle near the Petitcodiac River, he proceeded to erect a dwelling and barns near the bank he purchased from George Wortman in 1778 which extended to the western boundary of the Township." <i>Resurgo I p.83.</i>
Amity	First British barque to come from overseas to pick up sawn lumber from the Township of Moncton.
Anastasia F	Ship built in Moncton in 1879 by George Platt Jardine. The schooner weighed 64 tons. "The Anastasia was registered in Parrsboro, NS in 1889, and was owned there by S. F. Haws, and in 1892 by L. Lovels." <i>City of Moncton's bank of Names.</i>
Brevet	Ship built in 1853 in Moncton at the Joseph Salter shipyard.
Caspian	1018-ton ship built in Moncton by Harris in 1857 for William Henry Adams. It was later sold in Liverpool.
Gambia	Ship built in Moncton in 1849 in the Salter shipyard. The vessel weighed 567 tons.
Hercules	First locomotive to run on the E.N.A.R. line that ran from Moncton to Pt. Du Chene.
Hurricane	599-ton barque built in Moncton by Joseph Salter in 1863.
Isabella	Brig built in Moncton in 1859 by Joseph Salter.
Kesmark	Barque built in Moncton by Thomas Cochran and launched on July 5, 1879.
Lady Clarendon	Ship built in 1856 by Joseph Salter. The 1,344-ton vessel is the largest ship built in Moncton by Salter.
Lady Russell	Ship built in Moncton in 1851 in the Salter Shipyard. The vessel weighed 906 tons.
Lancefield	994-ton barque built in Moncton in 1881 by Crandall & Co.
Larch	Barque built in Moncton in 1845 in Stephen Binney's shipyard.
Maggie Miller	1332-ton ship built in Moncton by Salter in 1855.
Matchless	First vessel built in Moncton. It weighed about 250 tons and James Robertson was the one who built it in 1825.
Melbourne	Ship built in Moncton by Joseph Salter in 1856. The vessel weighed 1212 tons.
Meta	772-ton ship built in Moncton in 1857 by Joseph Salter.
Metagama	Name of the ship that the Acadians of the 165 th battalion, along with the 198 th battalion of Toronto and the Nova Scotia Highlanders, traveled on to get to Liverpool, England during World War I.
Molasses	The "molasses boats" were regular arrivals at the port of Moncton with barrels of molasses.

Persian	Ship built in Moncton by Joseph Salter in 1856.
Recruit	995-ton ship built in Moncton by Joseph Salter in 1852.
Samson	Locomotive that ran on the ENAR railway line between Moncton and Pt. Du Chene.
Shad	Type of boat used by Acadians for fishing.
Tantivy	1040-ton ship built in Moncton in 1851 by Joseph Salter. It was sold in Liverpool.
Timandra	Ship built in Moncton in 1853.
Turon	Ship built in Moncton in 1854 by M.S. Harris for Salter. Sold in Liverpool as an Australian packet.
Veloz	571-ton barque built in Moncton by Joseph Salter.

Amiens	Amiens, France is a sister / partner city to the City of Moncton.
Bavaria	Region of Germany where many of the new settlers of Moncton were from. The “poutine rapée”, a traditional Acadian meal is a variation of the Bavarian knodel, a specialty of the region of Bavaria.
Cumberland	Loyalists of this region near Sackville settled in the Moncton area. <i>Resurgo, vol 1 p. 105.</i>
Darbénai	Members of the Jewish community immigrated from Darbénai, Lithuania to settle in Moncton in 1905.
Francfort	A township settled near modern Fredericton in the 18 th century.
Lafayette	Lafayette, Louisiana is a sister / partner city to the City of Moncton.
Lakeville	Community on the outskirts of Moncton at Elmwood Drive.
Louisbourg	Fort built by the French in Cape Breton. English attacked the fort successfully in 1755.
Louisiana	State in the United States where many Acadians found themselves after the expulsion of 1755 known as the <i>Deportation</i> . Many Acadian descendents still live in the region today.
Medicine Hat	Medicine Hat, Alberta is a sister / partner city to the City of Moncton.
New France	Acadia became part of an area known as New France when the French came to the region. <i>P. 18, Resurgo vol. 1</i>
North Bay	North Bay, Ontario is a sister / partner city to the City of Moncton.
Pennsylvania	In 1766, families from the State of Pennsylvania came to this region to settle.
Poitou	Region of France where many of the Acadian descendants originated.
Poitiers	Poitiers, France is a sister / partner city to the City of Moncton.
Yorkshire	County of England. Some Colonists of this county settled in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick in the 18 th century.

Bonappetit	Nickname used for the Lalande family as well as the name of their village, located in the West End of present day Moncton.
Congrès	The congrès mondial acadien was held in Moncton in 1994.
De la Colline	Acadian family name found in 1758 in the region of Moncton. <i>p. 22, Resurgo vol 1.</i>
Escaouette	Acadian theatre company founded in 1978 in Moncton.
Frolic	It is for the Acadians a time to meet, to talk, to dance and sing.
Jagersome	Name given by the Acadians to the city known today as Dieppe. <i>Chocolate River</i>
Jeanne d’Arc	Patroness Saint of France in recognition of Acadian French Monctonians.
La Vallière	Governor of Acadia in 1678. <i>Resurgo. P.18</i>
Le Coude	Acadian name for Moncton where it was located at the bend of the Petitcodiac River.
Le Cran	Village on the Petitcodiac River known today as Stoney Creek. Joseph Brossard was one of the first settlers in that area. <i>Chocolate River p. 26.</i>

Le Mascaret	French and Acadian name for the Tidal Bore phenomenon.
Mascaret	Tidal river. The Petitcodiac is famous for this natural phenomenon.
Sagouine, La	Well-known fictive character in the Acadian community created by Antonine Maillet.
Sigogne	Priest that was charged with the care of First Nations and Acadians.
Silvabro	Name given to the region of Lewisville (today) by the Acadians.
Terre-Rouge	Early Acadian name for Moncton.

Local Land Marks in Moncton (Old Neighbourhoods, Stories, etc.)	
Black Diamond	Moncton neighborhood in the area of west St George Street.
Cherryfield	Parish of Moncton located in the vicinity of McLaughlin Road.
Cummings	Name of the first local brickyard that was owned and operated by James Cummings in Lewisville from approximately 1860-1916.
Davidson	Theatre that was located on Main Street and owned and operated by Walter Davidson. It was later re-named the Empress in 1911 under new management and was destroyed by fire in 1926.
Dreamland	Silent film theatre that opened in 1907 on Main Street and was managed by Walter Davidson.
Empress	Silent film theatre that opened on Main street in August of 1911.

Imperial, The	Early Moncton movie theatre. When the Capitol and the Empress Theatres burned down in March 1926, it was the only movie theatre remaining in the city for a while.
Lorenzen	Pottery company owned by the Lorenzen family. Ernest Lorenzen was born in Denmark. They settled in Dieppe and he and his wife started a clay pottery business. <i>Telegraph Journal, March 23, 1949.</i>
Metropolitan	Name of a Moncton skating rink built in 1892 behind the old City Market.
Meyer	Name of photography studio in Moncton that was owned and operated by Charlie Meyer.
Minto	Name of the hotel located on Robinson street owned by Patrick Gallagher and his wife. The hotel was destroyed by fire in 1917.
Naples	Name of an early banking institution on Main Street in Moncton that was a branch of the Bank of Naples and catered to Moncton’s growing Italian community at the turn of the century.
Newton Heights	Moncton neighborhood off west Main Street.
Paramount	Name of one of Moncton’s former movie theatres on Main Street.
Parkton	Moncton neighborhood off Mountain Road.
Pythian	Named after the Order of Knights of Pythias, an international non-sectarian fraternal order, established in 1864 in Washington, DC, by Justus T. Rathbone. The Moncton lodge was established in Moncton in 1875.
Resurgo	Latin and means “to rise again”. Motto for the City of Moncton.
Ruse	The Clark Ruse Aircraft Limited operated a factory in Lakeburn, NB during WWII.
Saxby	Name of a gale storm that hit the Maritime Provinces in 1869 and caused widespread damage along the Petitcodiac River and in Moncton.
Song Lee	Name of a Chinese laundry on St. George Street that was owned and operated by Song Lee.
St. Bernard	Irish parish in Moncton in early 1900.
St. Andrews	In recognition of the Scots of Moncton.
St. Patrick	In recognition of the Irish of Moncton. The Apostle of Ireland.
Vulcan	Former name of a street in Moncton. (Now known as Lester Avenue).

Balbo	“One of the greatest aviation feats in the early days of flying occurred in July of 1933 and it focused world attention upon the seaside town of Shediac. It was the then-spectacular flight by Italian Air Marshal Italo Balbo and his fleet of 25 Italian Air Force seaplanes traveling from Italy to the World’s Fair in Chicago.” <i>Resurgo II.p. 300</i>
Chautauqua	American circuit performers: world-renowned lecturers, musicians, orators, and philosophers who performed in Moncton in 1918. <i>P. 202 Resurgo II</i>
Confederation	Name of the bridge that links New Brunswick to Prince Edward Island.
Fort Cumberland	Name of the fortification on the Tantramar Marshes occupied by the British.
Micmac / Mi’kmaq	Name of the First Nations people that lived in this region.
Utrecht	Name of Treaty that ceded the land of Nova Scotia occupied by the French to Great Britain in 1713. <i>p. 19 Resurgo. Vol 1, Chocolate River p 2.</i>
